

Rutland House / Queens Avenue PPG Survey summary analysis May 2021

This survey was launched at the Rutland House / Queens Avenue open PPG meeting on 15th April 2021. The survey closed on 4th May 2021.


Over 194 people attended the meeting. 44 people completed the survey.

How was the merger meeting?

- 88% of respondents found the PPG merger meeting useful. Most respondents made positive comments about the information available at the meeting and the way it was managed.

- Some respondents did not notice that the FAQ and Service Commitment were linked to in the Eventbrite event listing and wished that they had read them beforehand.


Future involvement in the PPG

There was a lot of enthusiasm for getting involved in the new merged PPG:

- 20 respondents would like to attend future PPG meetings and a further seven would attend “possibly” or “maybe”.
- Eight respondents would be interested in receiving training for taking part in PPG meetings, however they did not state what kind of training they would like. Some would like to know what kind of training would be useful for them.
- Four respondents would like to help organise activities, whilst a further nine would possibly like to organise them.

Answered: 42 Skipped: 2



- 15 respondents shared that they had skills and experience that might be helpful to the PPG including managing meetings, employment law, mental health advocacy, secretary and chair of various organisations, retired journalist, people skills.
- 38 people answered ‘yes’ to question 7: Do you want to receive news and be notified of upcoming events?
- 26 people left their contact details so that the PPG could contact them about their responses.

Demographic data

Three quarters of the respondents were female. All except two respondents were over the age of 50. 79% of the respondents were White British. The next largest ethnic group was White Other, at 14%. One person was bilingual (English/German) and one person’s first language was Italian. All the other respondents’ first language was English.
